The Continuous Internal Evaluation system is done meticulously to ensure potential and level of achievement of each learner. The evaluation reforms at University are effectively implemented by constituting a Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC). DLMC consists of Principal, Head of the Departments and DLMC constitute three senior faculties. DLMC departments maintain records pertaining to the assessment and evaluation. Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and End Semester Examinations (ESE). The DLMC and CLMC process. The schedule of internal examinations is announced and questions are collected by the internal examination committee. All internal assessment marks are collected by the board of respective departments. Complaints, if any, are first addressed by the respective departments then forwarded to the college level committee and remedial actions are taken. The results are uploaded in the university website. Hard copies of CE grade sheets are maintained. University guidelines for evaluation reforms are austere followed. The results are analyzed to analyze the results and decide on steps to be taken to improve the quality of education.
