The Certificate Course in 'Computerized Accounting' offered by the Centre for Adult Continuing Education (CACEE), University of Kerala was started in the academic year 2011-2012.

An advisory committee of continuing education unit was constituted in D.B College, Sasthamcotta (Proceedings no. PL/18/2011 Dated 7<sup>th</sup> October 2011) in the academic year 2011-2012. The first batch was started on 26.11.2011 with 16 students. There were 40 students for the second batch which was started on 07.03.2013 and completed on 12.06.2013.The third batch was started on 26.07.2013 with 40 students and completed on 04.02.2014. The fourth batch was started on October 2016 with 18 students and completed on December 2016.

About 20 % of the students were from outside the campus. The college was benefitted by this programme as there was some funding for the development of infrastructure.

- 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation
- Students are periodically evaluated by conducting test papers, assignments, group discussions and seminars etc.
- Internal examinations are conducted based on a common time table in accordance with the decision of CLMC as per the guidelines of the University and feedback is taken systematically through PTA meeting.
- As per the norms of University, a minimum of 75% attendance is essential for students to appear for the university examinations. The process of continuous assessment, guaranteeing marks, attendance, assignments, internal tests and seminars help all the departments to monitor effectively academic performance of student.
- Model Practical Examination and mock viva are also conducted.
- Results of University Examination are evaluated systematically through College Council and PTA.

## **Innovations and Best Practices**

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the Department. Give details.

The innovations during the academic year were quite remarkable including a handful of activities viz. The Hindi department has conducted a procession from the college to the town in connection with the Hindi Fortnight Celebration to create awareness about our national language in the locality.

The Department of English has conducted various programmes to bring out the creativity in students.

The Department of Botany has introduced exotic varieties of flowering plants in the campus to enhance the floral diversity of the campus. Monthly campus weed management by the students is also encouraged. Team Teaching - To share the expertise of various teachers, departments organized team teaching sessions based on the specialization of teachers.

There were several occasions for interaction between students and retired faculties. Frequent interactions between teachers and parents regarding the academic status of each student helped to improve results.

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year

In connection with the plastic ban, steel plates and glasses has been provided to the college canteen to avoid plastic wrapping paper and wax coated plastic cups.

The procession conducted by the Hindi department helped to create an awareness about our national language in the locality. Students from rural areas can be taught Hindi and they get more opportunities especially outside Kerala. These students can also popularise the importance of Hindi among the public.

'Nakshathravanam'(27 species of plants which represent 27 stars, according to astrology) is planted and maintained by the Botany department to conserve plants.

To enrich the student-farmer concept, the Department of Botany has conducted several agricultural field visits to learn eco-friendly practices.

The college has purchased cattle with a view to enhance organic farming and is planning to curb milk adulteration in future.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the Institution (please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals)

Best Practice -1. Mentoring system was practiced to assist student progression both in the academics and their life on campus. Each member of the faculty was assigned with students of their departments. A register was prepared. Each student was required to meet their mentor at least two times a semester. Based on these interactions the mentor recommended the mentee for remedial measures.

Best Practice -2. Energy conservation practices by students.

The college campus has been declared as plastic free zone. Necessary steps are being taken for the fulfilment of this declaration.

Communication skills development classes in nearby schools are conducted by the English Department.

Peer teaching and seminar presentations using power point by various departments.

Financial assistance to poor students.

Book Lending system for financially backward students by the Department of Malayalam.

The students take initiative for the noon meal programme in nearby hospitals.

Organic farming and student-farmer concept has been developed by the Department of Botany to create awareness and necessity of agricultural and cultivation practices.

ICT enabled teaching in various departments.

Preparation of Seed Bank, Crop survey and Taxonomical field visits by the Department of Botany.

To develop a sustainable ecosystem, the college maintains goats, rabbits, love birds etc. and has facilitated the opportunities for bird watching.

To inculcate healthy food habit and to make aware of the perilous effect of consumption of fast food

, the college and various departments conduct food fest occasionally.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

The college celebrate World Environmental Day every year. The Department of Botany has taken initiative in planting rare and ornamental plant saplings. The department also proposes to make a Biodiversity registry to document richness of flora of Sasthamcotta Lake which is one of the Ramsar site.

The college authorities have taken initiative to reduce dumping plastic and other waste materials in the college premises to curb water pollution.

The Department has conducted classes on Environmental studies.

Most of our students are actively participating in clubs like 'Bhoomithra Sena Club', 'Biodiversity Club' and 'Punarjani Club', which are aimed for environmental protection activities.

# Strengths

Though the college campus is situated in a rural area, the results of each year is much higher than the university average and the college produces rank holders in several subjects every year.

The students can experience ecological harmony due to the presence of the Sasthamcotta Lake.

Politics is banned in the college campus to enable peaceful academic atmosphere.

- The college has improved its infrastructural facilities with ample support from the management.
- With the appointment of permanent teachers to vacancies earlier filled by guest lecturers, the teaching process has been strengthened.
- The college has geared its efforts to avail of financial assistance from bodies like the UGC, as seen in the number of research projects sanctioned.
- The achievement of the students in sports activities is meritorious.

- The NSS unit of this college which has been selected as the best NSS unit at the University level has been continuing activities related to institutional social responsibility.
- Highly motivated faculty and the committed activities of the Parent-Teacher Association prove to be a strength to the functioning of the college.

### Weaknesses

- Even after the recent improvements to the infrastructure, the college needs more facility to accommodate the newly-sanctioned courses.
- The academic background of the families of the students who are firstgeneration learners prove to be a weakness in effective teachinglearning, especially in English communication skills. Remedial measures are being undertaken to overcome this hurdle.

# **Opportunities**

- The college is waiting the sanctioning of new courses by the Government and the appointment of new faculty members to the vacant posts in the near future.
- The Post-graduate departments of Sanskrit, English and the department of Malayalam are engaged in the efforts to upgrade themselves as Research departments.
- The recognition gained by the NSS unit of this college has given an added impetus for activities reflecting social commitment.

# Threats

- Motivating students who are first generation learners from financially underprivileged background is a challenge. Such students who form a large number of the student population have employment as their immediate aim.
- The rural area where the college is situated provides a pleasant ambience for teaching-learning, but it also a challenge to be overcome since students of such a college have to struggle more to avail of facilities and opportunities on par with students from an urban background.
