





FIRST DEGREE PROGRAMME UNDER CHOICE BASED CREDIT AND SEMESTER (CBCS) SYSTEM

FDP Under CBCSS	
Academic Programme	ENTIRE COURSE OF STUDY as per given scheme and examinations
Academic Calendar	There shall be a uniform calendar prepared by the University for the conduct of the Academic Programme
Semester	Minimum of 90 working days/18 weeks ODD (June-Oct)and EVEN (Dec-April) Semesters
Course	Portion of a subject to be taught- similar to paper in annual scheme

FOUNDATION, LANGUAGE & CORE COURSES...

- 'Course' means a portion of a subject to be taught and evaluated in a semester
- 'Foundation Course' means a Course at the foundation level that all students of the First Degree Programme have to register
- 'Language Courses' are Courses in English and an Additional Language of student's choice, for which all the students who join for First Degree Programmes have to register
 - * Language Courses and Foundation Courses shall be offered in the 1st, 2nd,3rd and 4th semesters
- 'Core Course' means a compulsory Course in a Major Subject related to the First Degree Programme in a discipline

COMPLEMENTARY, OPEN & ELECTIVE COURSES...

- 'Complementary Course' means a Course in a subject other than the Major Subject and is complementary to it.
- 'Open Course' means an Optional Course which the student is free to take at his/her will. Open Course shall be a Non-Major Elective Course offered by the Departments other than the Parent Department.
- 'Elective Course' means a Specialized Course from the frontier area of the Core Subject, offered by the Parent Department which he/she is free to choose.
- 'Credit' (C) of a Course is a measure of the weekly unit of work involving lecture or laboratory session or seminar or similar activity assigned to for the Course.
- The course shall include a compulsory Project / Dissertation to be undertaken during the 5th / 6th semester.

GRADE, GRADE POINT, SCPA....

- 'Grade' indicates the level of performance of a student in a Course
- 'Grade Point' is an integer indicating the numerical equivalent of the broad level of performance of a student in a Course. The product of Grade Point and the Credit of a Course is called 'Credit Point'
- <u>'Semester Credit Point Average'</u> (SCPA) is an index of the overall performance of a student at the end of a semester. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the Credit Points obtained by a student at the end of a semester by the sum of the Credits of Courses taken by the student in the semester.

CCPA, GRACE MARKS....

- 'Cumulative Credit Point Average' (CCPA) indicates the broad academic level of performance of the student in a Programme. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the Credit Points in all the Courses taken by the student for the entire Programme by the total number of Credits.
- 'Grace Marks' means marks awarded to a student in recognition of meritorious achievements in Sports/Arts/NCC/NSS

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>

- Students who secure a minimum of 75% attendance in the aggregate for all the Courses of a semester taken together alone will be allowed to register for End Semester Evaluation.
- Others have to repeat the semester along with the next batch
- They could make up the shortage of attendance through condonation
- Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of a Degree Programme shall be granted by the University on valid grounds

BOARD OF STUDIES, COURSES AND SYLLABI ..

- The Boards of Studies (in each subject) shall design all the Courses and syllabi for each Course in that subject offered in the First Degree Programme subject to the Regulations of the University
- The syllabus for a Course shall include: Course Code, the title of the Course, the statement of the aims and objectives of the Course and the number of Credits; instructional hours in terms of lectures, tutorials, and laboratory sessions with the pre-requisites if any, for taking the Course. The Course content shall be given in a unitized manner along with a list of reading materials.

EXAMINATION PATTERN

- CONTINUOUS EVALUATION (CE) 20 MARKS
- END SEMESTER EVALUATION (ESE) 80 MARKS

ASSIGNMENTS OR SEMINARS: (MAX. MARKS 10)

Each student shall be required to do one assignment or one seminar for each Course. Assignments/Seminars shall be evaluated on the basis of their quality. The teacher shall define the expected quality of an assignment in terms of structure, content, presentation etc. Due weight shall be given for punctuality in submission. Seminar shall be similarly evaluated in terms of structure, content, presentation, interaction etc.

TEST PAPER: (MAX. MARKS 10)

For each Course there shall be one class test during a semester

CE is calculated by adding the marks obtained in both assignment/ seminar and test

CONTINOUS EVALUATION

 The marks of a Course are consolidated by combining the marks of ESE and CE (80+20)

 A minimum of 40% marks (E Grade)is required for passing a Course with a separate minimum of 40%(E Grade) for Continuous Evaluation and End Semester Evaluation

SOCIAL SERVICE/EXTENSION ACTIVITY

It is mandatory for a student to participate in any one of the following Social Service/Extension Activities for not less than forty hours, during the 3rd and 4th semesters, for successful completion of the Programme.

1. Event

3. Objectives

Student Induction Programme is designed to orient students about the history of the institution, Vision, Mission, code of conduct, structure of the programme, mode of conduct of examinations, various clubs and forums functioning in the college and the activities in the department.

4. Planning

In the begging of every academic year, the IQAC prepare the action plan and tentative dates for the conduct of induction programme were chosen. 6. Learning

- 1. After the inaugural function, Dr. Sushil Kumar R., convener Grievance redressal cell addressed the students and explained the code of conduct and moralities one should practice in life as well as in the campus, how to get acquainted real meaning of Success, how to tackle unplanned situations and tragedies of life and the implementation of intrinsic and extrinsic approach to achieve the destination.
- 2. During the power point presentation, Dr. Jayasree V.Coordinator, IQAC explained the cirumstances in which the college was established, the initiatives taken by Sri. Kumbalathu Sankupillai, the founder of the college, a great visionary and philanthropist, after whom the college was re-named. She explained the role of IQAC in college and the different programmes offered by the college.
- 3. Dr. Rathika Nath G. representing the CLMC, during her presentation explained the programme structure and examination pattern etc. The student was able to get acquainted with the semester pattern which was different than the annual pattern.
- 4. Dr. S. Susanth, convener, anti- ragging cell, through his video presentation explained the consequences of ragging.
- 5. The programme enables the interaction between teachers and students before the commencement of the regular classes. This interaction & planning helps in effective delivery of lectures and tutorial/practical.
